CONSOLIDATED EDISON OPENS ENERGY INFORMATION CENTER

The nation's most complete Energy Information Center for consumers was opened by Con Ed recently at Lexington Ave. and 42nd St. in the Chrysler Bldg. It is open Monday-Saturday, 10 A. M.-6:30 P. M., admission free.

The center is devoted to helping consumers save money through effective energy conservation practices and includes displays on insulation, efficient appliances, weather stripping, storm doors and windows.

GATEWAY ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY CENTER GROUP

City school children and teachers visited Gateway beaches and wetlands and participated in gardening and nutrition workshops this fall at three different campsites including the new and distinctive Ecology Village. Teachers were able to take in-service training in camping skills, birding, marine environments.

There will be a teacher workshop on alternative gardening and solar energy, Jan. 19. The second annual Winter Wonders program for teachers, Jan. 26, will include indoor and outdoor activities on marine environments, nature photography, energy conservation, other related topics. Teachers who attend either workshop (Jan. 19/26) may bring classes to Gateway for special winter programs.

During the spring semester, the Center will again offer in-service courses for teachers. They will include a series in beginning photography, coastal environment and a camping skills course. *

*Secondary school teachers will have the opportunity to attend a 6-session course introducing the new environmental science curriculum for grade 9, given by Alan Ascher, one of the curriculum guide authors & an EEAC member.

POCONO ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION CENTER

The Pocono Environmental Education Center (PEEC) is a residential field center in northeastern Pennsylvania. New projects in 1980 include solar energy, leadership training, outdoor science education.

PEEC'S solar energy project includes a cabin retrofitted with solar panels to provide both heat and hot water and can demonstrate to visitors and students the viability of solar energy as a home-heating source.

On April 18-20 and August 15-17, **FEEC** and the National Science Foundation will present Outdoor Science Education Workshops. They are designed to help science educators and others to acquaint themselves with new developments in the field of outdoor science educational programs.

On August 11-15, PEEC and the National Science Supervisors Association will conduct a leadership conference focusing on contemporary science concerns. Funded by the National Science Foundation, the conference will be primarily for science supervisors from the northeastern U.S. and will include workshops on leadership, skills, teacher evaluation, curriculum development, other topics.

COUNCIL ON THE ENVIRONMENT, N.Y.C.

The Council is promoting four programs. <u>Open Space Gardening</u>: technical and mechanical assistance to community groups involved in gardening and design of vacant lots. Also involved in the design and building of selected neighborhood small parks.

<u>Greenmarket</u> has expanded its farmers' produce markets to 10 locations this year. <u>Office Paper Recycling Bureau</u> working to set up programs in several private office buildings.

Environmental Education developing program and curriculum to train college/high school students to organize schools and community groups for participation in environmental projects. The program still offers walking tours, energy curriculums, related materials. CENYS offers a bi-monthly newsletter, a radio show 'Our Daily Planet', also workshops, conferences, meetings from time to time.
