As we gather in Burlington, Vermont at our first National Congress for Environmental Education Futures: Policies & Practices we have much to accomplish. Most of us agree that problems exist with environmental education and that something needs to be done to resolve them. This "something" is a primary challenge for those of us who represent the twenty-one organizations that are now collectively addressing national issues in, for, and about environmental education.

A recent report from the Nation Commission on Excellence in Education is generating talk that education will be a major issue in the 1984 Presidential campaign. All this talk should seem heartening to environmental educators; however, are we ready for it? Do we have a vision, a consensus on goals, a sense of priorities within our own organizations, let alone with regard to local, state, regional, national, and global environmental education needs? The answers vary from organization to organization and even within our organizations. There appears to be little concurrance as to how best to pursue a quest for excellence in, for, and about environmental education.

Yes! environmental education will need financing. However, merely to ask government for "more" as we did in the seventies probably won't work. Neither will a divided front. A model is needed for environmental organizations both governmental and non-governmental, that helps us to work better cooperatively.

Diversity is still a desirable characteristic within our national environmental education movement. It remains a source of our strength. Efforts to enhance excellence and to expand citizen support must be pressed by the conjoining of interests that embrace all segments of the environmental education community. These efforts will require a cooperation and commitment as never before. The demand for active leadership and statesmanship among us is at its greatest.

This Congress marks the beginning of a major new initiative that focuses on action in the arenas of both policy and practice. There are active leaders from key organizations present. This Congress is supported and financed by diverse interests representing business, industry, labor, foundations, and education.

Welcome to the first Congress of this nature. The Congress steering committee and their members have worked diligently to plan and present on of the more timely and important national educational meetings ever. The new connections- webs of networks and interactions between and among people with kindred interest has helped to make this initiative one of excitement and promise.

Mike Zamm reports on the activities of EEAC's Legislative Committee...

The Committee is involved in spearheading an effort to formalize environmental education throughout New York State public schools. Through the efforts of EEAC Chairperson, Nancy Wolf, and Committee Members Lenore Miller, John Kominski, Lys McLaughlin, Lillian Lesser, Bob Finkelstein, and Tom Colwell, and Advisory Members Jack Padalino and Gene Ezersky, the Committee will be launching two strategies this fall. First, environmental educators from various parts of the State will be attending ten Regents Commissioners Conferences to speak for a more structured approach to environmental education. Second, a mini-conference bringing together key environmental educators from important organizations within the State will be held this November in Albany. The purpose of this conference will be to develop a coherent strategy and proposal for New York State environmental education from the many ideas that have been suggested so far - mandated courses, formal testing, teacher training requirements and legislative mandate.

The American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Council recently elected John Padalino, Director of Pocono Environmental Education Center, as a Fellow of the Association. A Fellow is "a Member whose efforts on behalf of the advancement of science or its applications are scientifically or socially distinguished." Mr. Padalino, who has been a Member of AAAS for a number of years, was cited for his "contributions to science education, in particular, for service to professional societies and administration of outdoor environmental education centers."

Conferences and Workshops in Environmental Education

The Pocono Environmental Education Center (PEEC) will convene an <u>Outdoor Managers' Colloquium December 2-4</u>, 1983. The weekend workshop, open to administrators of outdoor centers or programs, is being co-sponsored by the Association of Interpretive Naturalists, The National Science Supervisors Association and PEEC.

Working sessions will focus on the Colloquium's major themes: Funding, Marketing and Support Services. Topics such as funding sources, money management, business systems and computer applications, program organization, networking, staff development, and health and safety will be covered by experienced outdoor administrators.

Dr. John Kirk, Director of the New Jersey School of Conservation, will present the keynote address Friday evening. Outdoor activities, sharing sessions and a square dance will complement the working sessions throughout the weekend.

The cost for the three-day meeting will be \$40, which includes room and board, and all colloquium activities. For further information, contact PEEC, (717) 828-2319.

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A Learning Styles Workshop will be held March 16-18, 1984 at the Pocono Environmental Education Center (PEEC) in Dingmans Ferry, Pa. Dr. Bernice McCarthy, a nationally recognized leader in educational theory and technology, will conduct the workshop, which is open to all educators, trainers and course developers.

Dr. McCarthy will explain current research and connections between learning styles and left/right brain dominance. She will present an educational training model (The 4Mat System) which is based on the strengths of four major learning styles. Participants will learn applications of the 4Mat model for all teaching and training levels.

PROSPECT PARK ENVIRONMENTAL CENTER

Until October 7th, NYC youngsters will get to know the Brooklyn Bridge-inside, outside, under and across the mighty span. As part of the Brooklyn Bridge Centennial Celebration, school and other youth groups may take part in a trip that begins inside the vaulted chambers of the Brooklyn Anchorage, situated beneath the approach to the Bridge. Here children can experience the "Anatomy of a Bridge" exhibit. Youngsters can also have a sing-along of the "Ballad of the Brooklyn Bridge," build a suspension bridge using ropes and their own bodies, or search for fossils in the building stones of the Anchorage. Only then does the group proceed on its guided walk across the span to Manhattan, learning more about the bridge as it goes. The program, made possible through a grant from the Vincent Astor Foundation, is an hour and one half in length.
