If You've Never Seen FRESH KILLS, You've Never Seen Garbage

Saturday, May 31, 1986

Disposing of garbage is serious business...especially in New York City, where there are 22,000 tons of waste to get rid of every day. About half goes to FRESH KILLS LANDFILL on Staten Island, the largest landfill in the world. It's a complex operation that involves barging the waste down the river, digging out the barges with gigantic cranes, transporting the waste to the dump site, compacting it, contouring it, covering it with earth, and pumping out the valuable methane gas. It also requires a huge support system of dispatchers, welders, carpenters, electricians, mechanics and a blacksmith to make the tools and parts.

EEAC NEWS

EEAC Legislative Forum Great Success

Some 75 environmental educators/environmentalists - teachers, graduate students, representatives of non-profit organizations, community residents, attended EEAC's Legislative Forum at the Fireboat House on March 15. Assemblyman Pete Grannis laid out a very specific set of important environmental laws that need support in his keynote address and City Councilman Sheldon Leffler articulated his areas of concern as he starts his tenure as Chairman of Council's Environmental Protection Committee. Nancy Wolf moderated the Legislative session.

Andee Jacobs (elementary grades water conservation) and Mike Zamm (high school - noise pollution) followed, highlighting how to involve students in legislative and other action projects around environmental issues. John Kominski moderated the "action" presentation.

After the plenary session, a lively discussion of possible EEAC areas of concentration emphasized graffiti and noncompliance with the dog litter law as serious quality of life issues. The suggestion by one participant to start an EEAC legislative newsletter supplement will be seriously considered. Many participants agreed to write letters to their local legislators in an effort to get the Museum Educational Services Air Act passed - a bill which included funding for environmental centers and non-profit cultural education institutions that do classroom sessions. Dr. George Murphy's talk on the history of the Fireboat House and Rose Blaustein's description of the Fireboat Houst's program were also highlights of the day.

Thanks to Rose for providing the wonderful Fireboat House space, and baked goodies, and to Robin Tinkler and Stan Mandel for all their help.

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All of EEAC's 34 nominees for the Talent Bank for New York State Environmental Education Curriculum have been accepted by the State Department of Education. They will begin infusing state education concepts into state syllabus and curriculum, with writing going on throughout this spring.
